


Big Picture

- Knowledge is encoded in text
- There's far too much text!
 - Text summarization
 - Document classification
- Maximum Accuracy of 70-90%
 - That's one mistake in 10 words!
- We need more accuracy
 - Semantic relations




Overview





Word Features

(Harley 2006, Richards 2001, Marantz 1997, Pesetsky 1995, Larson 1988)




Isabelle gave John the boot

Words are unsystematic

```
English
Get Married = (BECOME MARRIED)

French
Se Marier = (CAUSE MARRIED RECIPROCAL)

Hindi
Shadi Kar = (DO MARRIAGE)
```

However, words in context are predictable

- They helped him right away. ∃w: Q(they,w) = 1
 - Verb
- Thank you for your help.
 - Noun
- They clicked on the help icons. ∃x: (P&Q)(x) = 1
 - Adjective

 $\exists x : Q(x) = 1$





Person Agreement: finite verbs


- 1. Mathieu prends souvent le metro Mathieu takes the metro

Gender Agreement: non-finite verbs, adjectives

- 1. Mes belles grandes tables blanches

 My nice large tables white
- 2. Mere atse bade kale gadhe My nice big black donkeys

Agreement = Semantic operators



Take Home Message

- A paper # The paper # Paper # Papers
- Beef ≠ A cow ≠ Herd

However:

- Beef ≈ Cow material
- Suffixes = meaning
- Context = meaning
